


Pin your garment together so it looks like it's buttoned.




Stick a pin along the inside of the buttonhole of a horizontal buttonhole, or through the centre of a vertical buttonhole. Unpin the garment.



It is important to use a good quality thread. Heavy duty threads are recommended on outer garments, using a double strand. Use regular sewing thread for all other garments; take an extra long piece of thread, double it through the eye of the needle so that you end up with a short piece of




Make a knot at the end of the thread. Start from the right side of the garment, make a stitch, pick up button, and sew.



SEW THROUGH BUTTONS:

Allow "play" for sew through buttons by inserting a heavy duty pin, toothpick or matchstick over the button under the first stitch.





an "X" formation says couture and is the usual standard...








other variations:

Continue sewing through the button's holes. When using 4 threads at once, 4 times through a 2 hole button or 2 times through each set of a 4 hole button is enough for most garments; a few more times for outer or rugged garments.

On the last round, bring thread to right side of fabric and wind tightly around the "play" stitches under button to form a shank. Sew through your thread shank a couple of times for security, then bring thread to underside of fabric, sew through your stitches only and tie off.




SHANK BUTTONS:


It is usual to sew shank buttons so that the direction of the shank matches the direction of * the buttonhole.



Guide your needle through the shank and through the fabric to secure button; when using 4 threads at once, 4 times is enough for most garments, a few more times for outer or rugged garments.



On the last round, bring thread to right side of fabric and sew through your stitches a couple of times, then bring thread to underside of fabric, sew through your stitches only and tie off.





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
